


EXTRA SHOW DATES AND DEADLINES FOR TICKETS

CROSSWAYS RTV - aka MUD, MUD, GLORIOUS MUD

A record-breaking number of drivers – twenty three in all – signed on for The Dorset Land Rover Club's second RTV of the year at the Crossways site. After all the rain that had seemingly been falling for months, it was great to get offroad although like everywhere else, the ground conditions were as challenging as the courses that had been set.

Tow-ropes and winches were put to regular use on more or less every section of the trial – some of which took place in steeply undulating woodland and some of which was set out in a more open sandy quarry area. What looked at first like good, solid ground very rapidly turned into glutinous porridge in places, and some deep water-filled holes posed more than a few problems.

For the record, Trevor Harmer won the Long Wheel Base event in his Range Rover, going clear on five of the ten sections; the Short Wheel Base class was won by Martin Dover (with six 'clears') and in the Leaf Sprung class, club Chairman Rog Pardy came first in his unmodified Series 2.


To order a copy, write your name and the address to which you'd like it sent on a

SPONSORSHIP SOUGHT FOR CHARITY PROJECT

Neil Hopkins, step-son of Andy Wilson, has taken on a major project and is looking for sponsorship to help him raise money for Giving Africa, and thereby get to the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro. To have any chance of achieving this objective Neil has got to raise quite a lot of money through sponsorship and donations – just over £2.500 in fact....

The DLRC Committee has kindly given consent for this appeal to feature in The Dorset Rover, and there will be an opportunity to hear direct from Neil at the club night in May or June (still to be organised!) about what the project involves, and about how the money will be spent by Giving Africa in support of a school and educational infrastructure in Burkina Faso (statistically the poorest country in the world). Giving Africa exists to empower children through education.



Giving Africa works alongside local NGO's and the communities they serve, supporting them to improve access to quality education and skills training. Giving Africa strives to help communities achieve financial independence and self-sufficiency. Education is the key to a better future for Burkina's children. Giving Africa's project which the money raised from climbing Kilimanjaro will be supporting is Bethel Secondary School. Bethel school is an invaluable resource but is facing enormous challenges; including severe overcrowding, (650 students in 8 small classrooms) and terrible conditions for learning, (no lighting, ventilation or even basic teaching resources, chairs or desks). There is no skills training provision, resulting in very poor employment prospects.

As with most of the population, Bethel's children are undernourished which has a detrimental effect on their ability to learn. Working with the community, with AEAD and other NGO partners, **Giving Africa** plans to create a 'model of excellence' at Bethel. To do this, money raised will:

- Expand the school, creating an extra 300 places
- Vastly improve the environment and learning conditions
- Introduce a Vocational Skills Programme, providing training in locally viable crafts
- Introduce a food programme
- Develop a financially viable, sustainable business model, securing the school's future


£500 will fund a 'seat' for a child to attend school, giving them a vital chance of acquiring an education and the means to live and work independently.

BOOK REVIEW Off-Road Driving Manual

By Vince Cobley and Dave Phillips

Let's start with the writers of this book: Vince Cobley is arguably Britain's best-known off-roader, with over 25 years experience as a professional competitor and instructor, working for the Land Rover Experience and his own company, Pro-Trax, running off-road expeditions all over the world. Dave Phillips is one of Britain's best-known Land Rover journalists. A former editor of Land Rover Owner International, he drove his first Land Rover at the age of 14, in a farmer's field and since then he has driven off-road all over the world, from the Arctic Circle to



the Tropics.... So they should know what they're writing about!

I've got to say that this book is not just for beginners - there's a lot of very useful and detailed information, all very well illustrated with good quality, freshly taken pictures. The book covers the essentials, and it's pleasing to note that that there is thread throughout emphasising responsible recreational driving. Like all Haynes publications, it's well-laid out and can be dipped into as well as read as a book. The writing style of Philips and Cobley is refreshing and their enthusiasm shines through. Although aimed at and principally about Land Rovers, other marques do get a mention. The book also deals with the practicalities and capabilities of more modern, electronically assisted vehicles - so not just for Defender drivers!

The book is extensively illustrated – and it's nice to see some fresh pictures which really do illustrate the points being made. As a step-by-step manual, written by two renowned experts, it is aimed at all drivers wishing to learn to drive safely and successfully off-road, whether for the occasional trip across a field or to prepare for an off-road expedition in a remote part of the world. The down-to-earth text, supported by numerous graphics and illustrations, will appeal equally to those with no previous off-road driving experience as well as those wishing to develop existing skills to a higher level. The book covers vehicle preparation, including tyres. It goes on to discuss what are picked as the Top-ten off-road problems, and covers throttle control, steering and gear selection, hill climbs and descents, wading, winching and recovery, winter driving, mud and grass, ruts and uneven ground, ditch crossings and deep V-shaped gullies and side slopes. There's a section on towing on- and off-road (perhaps we should revive the trailer-towing trials of the early years of the club!).

GREEN LANES INITIATIVE LAUNCHED

Club night in March saw the launch of the club's Green Lane Initiative, promoting 'Responsible Rural Recreation'. A much-larger-than-usual turnout for club night listened to an excellent presentation, introduced by Rights of Way officer Jim Welch and delivered by Green Lanes officer Rob Elliott, and there was plenty of information, hints, tips and advice even for the experienced laners present.

There were some high-profile guests in the audience as well. Roger Bell, the Definitive Map Officer for DCC said that what DLRC could do to help DCC (and help to preserve what few lanes remain in the county) was to use the byways, and report back. He also added that it was important to contact his department to ask questions where there was no certain right of way, because there are many of these that are – in terms of usage – public rights of way, yet they remain unrecorded. He also said that he welcomed the partnership approach being advocated by DLRC, because there is a deadline of 2026 after which it will be impossible to add any rights of way that have not already been recorded. Rather gloomily, he also quoted the statistic that of the 3,000 miles of public highways in Dorset, only 26 miles are BOATs; more happily, he assured the audience that if we go down the proactive recording and questioning route, these byways will be preserved, and even added to.

Carol Shoopman from the British Horse Society was also delighted to be invited. As the County Access to Bridleways Officer for the BHS she stressed that for the vast majority of the time her members get on well with green laners – it's the 'mud-pluggers' that cause the problem. She welcomed our attitude towards responsible laning, especially the recommendation that when in the vicinity of horses, we pull over and switch engines off. She said that the BHS shared our alarm about the possible implications of deregulation, and went further, suggesting that we do a good job keeping lanes clear for horse riders.

Neil Watterson, Deputy Editor of Land Rover Owner International had come along as an observer and to find out what was happening in Dorset. He was impressed by our planned proactive and all-embracing approach, involving other user groups and the council, saying that as far as he was aware this was unique amongst Land Rover clubs in the UK.

In his PowerPoint presentation, Rob outlined what to do before going green laning in terms of planning and preparation and then went through the GLASS code of conduct. There was plenty of information about vehicle preparation, and lots of tips on safety. But the key message was the mantra 'Responsible Rural Recreation', and he urged all members to support the route the club was taking. He said: "We need to work with other people to show that we can do it right."

In the Q&A session that followed the various talks and presentations, the new club report form (that can be found on the website) was advocated as the best and easiest way of reporting routes and any problems. There was an explanation of how the GL officer and RoW officer can help and advise, and the evening concluded by summarising how important it was that we acted responsibly (for example, by imposing a voluntary moratorium on laning in the recent bad weather) and also that we took on board the message that it was vital that we used the recording system to provide evidence of use which can then be passed on to DCC for inclusion on the Definitive Map.

Huge thanks to Jim and Rob for all their hard work getting the project underway!

MEMBER PROFILE

Ron Hogg, DLRC Treasurer

Ever wondered how the financial wheels of the DLRC keep turning? Well, it's all thanks to the Treasurer, Ron Hogg, who joined the club in 2006. Ron cites as the main reason that he joined DLRC was simply that he'd bought a Land Rover and wanted to join a local club, and his 'fleet' of vehicles now includes a 1996 Defender 90, a 300Tdi van and a 1986 90 V8 pick up.



Since he's owned the 300Tdi he's put a new chassis underneath it (he did the work himself and the tale was told in the magazine) having purchased it from the National Trust, and while the body was off, he fitted new sports improved suspension, a winch and also gave the engine a bit of a tweak. The V8 is his latest project, but what with his day-job (that Ron describes as being a self-employed builder's skivvy!), it'll be a little while before it sees the road let alone the mud. Back in the day, Ron also owned a Discovery 1 200Tdi (his first Land Rover), then changed to a 300Tdi, until he decided to buy what he'd wanted all along.

But even before that, Ron was driving Land Rovers, because as a retained fire-fighter for Dorset Fire Service, he was driving a fully laden Defender 110 fire tender. The fire service sent him on a driver training course at Bovington, and he was amazed at what the vehicle would do, even with a tonne of water in the back.

Asked for his best experience in a Land Rover, Ron reckons that there are simply too many to pick one highlight, although he's in no doubt about the worst one, which occurred when he decided to go green laning on his own (and this was before GPS), ended up getting stuck, which meant he had to phone another club member for recovery (which is hard when you don't know where you are exactly....).

Giving vent to the realms of fantasy, if money were no object, Ron would buy a Range Rover Sport and trial it, and perhaps that's also the vehicle he'd use to fulfil his other driving ambition, which is to follow the route that Ewan McGregor and Charlie Boorman drove on 'The Long Way Round'. Failing that, the Pan-American Highway might be a simpler alternative.

For Ron, the best part of being a member of DLRC is that it doesn't matter what sort of Land Rover you drive, everyone gets treated the same. As well as being a very efficient treasurer, Ron is very much involved with RTV events and says that his favourite venue is Knitson (partly because it was his first ever trial on his birthday in 2006), and he still drives the occasional green lane, with his favourite route being The Gap route in the Brecon Beacons (though he's not sure if this awesome lane is still open to vehicles).

Asked how he'd persuade someone to buy a Land Rover, Ron replied: "If you have to persuade someone, they don't have the passion, and never will have!" Judging from what Ron has divulged in compiling this profile – he's definitely got it!

MEMBER PROFILE

RICH PARFITT

Rich is one of the younger committee members (he's a mere 27), and he joined the DLRC in 2009. Up until recently he was driving around in a much changed 1989 Defender 90 (with an auto gearbox and other bits and pieces) but he's currently looking around for another truck (and in the meantime keeps turning up to events in his dad's J**p). Prior to the Defender 90, Rich owned a Series 3 Lightweight which he used for trialling in the leaf-sprung class.

His earliest memory of driving anything with a green oval was having a go in a friend's Discovery 1 when he was 21, and Rich is

obviously hooked on the marque because when asked to imagine that he had to persuade someone to buy a Land Rover, he replied that he'd tell that "there are cheaper vehicles out there, but you'll always wish you'd bought a Land Rover."

Rich reckons his best experience in a Land Rover was winching a Discovery up a very steep, dry river bed in Croatia, but his worst experience was a little closer to home when he thumped into a depression whilst trialling at Portesham and came to a very abrupt stop, snapping a half-shaft and bending the front dumb-iron in the process.

Although he's looking around for a replacement for his Defender, his dream Land Rover would be the new Range Rover, and his dream driving location would be Fraser Island, just off the coast of Australia.

Since joining the club, Rich has been a regular competitor in trials, with Tincleton being his favourite venue, simply because "there are no trees to hit!". As well as competing, Rich is very much involved in setting up (and dismantling) the courses, and in spite of the hard work involved, reckons that the best part of being a member of the club is the trials, because it means being able to drive off-road locally, on private land, for a mere £22. He also goes green laning very occasionally, with his most memorable route being Strata Florida in Wales.

And finally, when asked if he could think of anything else he'd like to mention that readers of The Dorset Rover might find interesting, somewhat mystifyingly he replied: "A raisin dropped into a glass of fresh champagne will bounce continuously from the bottom the glass to the top." - 7. MOT or photocopy of your MOT must be shown (if an MOT is required for your vehicle)
- 8. An additional return spring is required on mechanical throttles
- 9. Steering linkages will be checked
- 10. Rear springs on coil-sprung trucks to be jubilee clipped (or similar) to prevent springs dislocating
- 11. Wheel spacers are not to be used
- 12. A 24mm, 3 strand, 8 ton tow-rope in nylon or polypropylene and suitable shackle to be carried for recovery user
- 13. Fire extinguishers are advised but not essential

Will vehicles please be at the site by 9.15am for scrutineering Anyone arriving after 10.00am will NOT be allowed to compete

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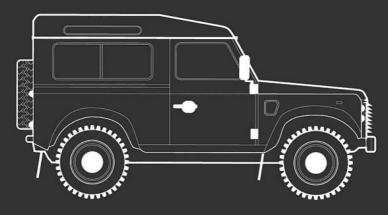


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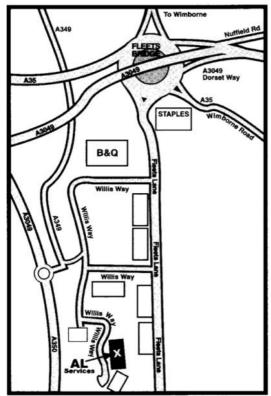
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
