YOUR CLUB COMMITTEE NEEDS YOU!

There are going to be two vacancies on the Club Committee when it comes around to the AGM in October. The Committee has decided to publicise these two posts now so that anyone interested can find out about the roles, and possibly work with the current incumbents to prepare for the changeover. Each of the current officers have written a few lines on what their roles involve...

CLUB TREASURER - currently Ron Hogg

HI, every single member will have at some time or other come into contact by whatever means with the club treasurer, whether simply to pay your annual membership, or for all sorts of other potential reasons, the role of club treasurer is one of the pivotal roles within the club committee, basically looking after and controlling the clubs cashflow, managing the membership subs and renewals, liaising with the membership secretary to let them know once people have paid and paying all the club invoices for the likes of such menial things as stamps, right across the board to trial site and permit fees, to club clothing and everything in between. The treasurer is also responsible for invoicing the advertisers in the club magazine, once per year per advertiser, and banking cash and cheques recieved, attending bi-monthly committee meetings in order to keep the committee abreast of the club financial situation.

There are roughly 100-120 payments out per year, and rarely does a week go by without something needing attention.

The treasurer is also responsible for creating the annual balance sheet to be presented to the AGM in October, and putting together the annual accounts for the club accountant, and liaising with them to sort any questions.

Ideally applicants for this role will be computer literate with ability to create spreadsheets, and deal with online banking and making BACs payments to various suppliers as and when needed. *Ron Hogg*

DEPUTY EVENTS SECRETARY - currently Rich Parfitt

At this year's AGM I will be standing down from the committee and the position of Deputy Events Secretary. This means the role is up for grabs and if you're an active member of the club, or looking to get more involved I would encourage you to consider the position. Essentially the role is to support the Events Secretary, currently Nigel Moore, in his duties. How this has worked in practice when running events is Nigel has booked the site with the land owner and arranged the permit. I have then arranged for a team to set out the event whether an RTV or a driving day ensuring all the necessary equipment is available. On a typical RTV I've done the sign on and delegated other tasks of the day such as scrutineering, marshalling and scorekeeping. Other tasks include paying the landowner and passing the permit onto the treasurer for payment. More general responsibilities include attending the committee meetings, helping other members of the committee with their duties and promoting the club through forums, social media and the website. Any training needed will be given but no specialist knowledge is required for this role.

Greenlane & BBQ day, 28th June

There are more details of how to be involved in this event on the club website (but make sure you are logged in as the page is a members-only area!) The idea is that between the participants, every BOAT (byway open to all traffic) in Dorset will be driven on the same day by club members, who will then be asked to fill in the club report form; these forms will be sent to DCC as evidence of usage and will provide data for the Definitive Map. The county will be split into 4 regions, N,S,E & W. each with a group leader and 4 spaces for members on each region. At the moment, Rob Elliott will lead the North Dorset group, Jim Welch will head up the southern party, and Ron Hogg will act as pathfinder for the western group. At the time of writing, we are still looking for a leader for the eastern group.

All the groups will converge on Ibberton Hill for a BBQ at around 6.00pm. Those of you who have read the club's History will know that Ibberton Hill was the meeting point for the club's first ever get together in August 1987 - so even if you can't do the green lane element (and places in the four groups will be limited anyway by the club's Responsible Rural Recreation policy) but you'd like to come along and be sociable in the early evening, the meeting place will be at the Ibberton Hill car park (grid reference ST792071) at around 6.00pm. GREEN LANE TRIP - MARCH 2014

Our first Green Lane trip since New Year's Day was on Sunday 23rd March 2014. We met at Corfe Castle, National Trust car park at 09.30 hrs and the group was made up of Rob Elliott, Tom Bayford (a new member), Les and Jane Wilkins, Jim and myself. It was a bright, sunny but chilly morning, which would make for a great day's laning; we would be able to see the wonderful scenery and landscape of this spectacular county, in which we live. We left the car park and (Rob led in his P38 Range Rover for the very first lane; then Jim took over in his 110 Defender), and went up Sandy Hill Lane, to the viewpoint over the top of the Purbecks, next to the mast. You could see Corfe Castle as clear as day. We stopped to admire the view and took some photographs; we then continued down Rollington Hill, past Rollington Farm and turned left back towards Corfe Castle. The next lane we drove was past Vineyard Holiday Cottage to the gates opposite. We went through two gates that are at 90° to each other and then drove up West Hill; this land is owned by the National Trust and is the start of the new Byway Open to All Traffic (BOAT). We then came to another gate. We went through this gate and this is the start of Byway 5. We stopped once all our vehicles were through the gate; last time Jim and I drove this Byway from the other direction it was rather overgrown; so we went to check it's condition before we drove on up through it. We were glad we did! This is where we did our very first lane clearing; we spent half an hour or so cutting back vegetation. Rob looked quite menacing with a set of long-handled secateurs in his hands and his comment was "I don't ram myself into any old bush these days! "

This set the banter and laughter for the rest of the day. As the 'boys' were busy cutting back the vegetation and clearing the lane; several cyclists came along the route and showed their appreciation for what we were doing, Once we had finished we continued on up the hill and admired some simply stunning views. We could see all the way across the Needles on the Isle of Wight.

We, from there, trekked slowly across the top of Ridgeway Hill and from the top looked down on the small Dorset Hamlets of Cocknowle and Church Knowle. We passed along this route; one particularly disgruntled 'Bobble-Hat' Rambler/Jogger, but decided best to ignore him. Rob felt left out, as the 'Bobble-Hat' never said anything to him. We thought that was probably because he looked like a Farmer/Land-owner in his checked - shirt and P38 Range Rover! When we got to the top we found out that the gate onto the byway that goes past Grange Arch, was locked. Now was the time to test the key that Jim has been given: (as we, DLRC, are exempt from the T.R.O. and Jim has been approved as a keyholder; as he is our Rights of Way Officer, GLASS Rep for Dorset and a member of the Dorset Land Access Forum), to open the gate. 'Hey Presto' it worked and no one was more relieved than Jim, especially after all the hard work he had put into locating this key. We continued driving the route and stopped at Grange Arch to admire the view and take some more photographs. This again produced an outstanding view through the Arch. Looking through the Arch you can see Creech Grange Manor House and it's surrounding estate. Part of the Estate is on a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and the outbuildings are home to a colony of Great Horseshoe Bats. The Estate and house have been owned by the Bond Family since 1861, and are still owned by the family currently. We stopped at the car park at Creech View Point for lunch; where we admired the beautiful countryside and munched our sandwiches.

Leaving Creech Car Park we drove down past Kimmeridge, onto Lulworth and up onto the lane that ends at Dagger's Gate. As we travelled along this UCR the visibility was excellent and the sun was still shining; as such you could look across and see Lulworth Bay and the spectrum of different hues of blue and green out on the sea. After Dagger's Gate we went onto the Jubilee Trail; here we encountered a large fallen tree and had to clear the route of branches so we could drive through safely. We then continued on to Moreton Ford. The flow of the river was definitely stronger than it has been previously and it was also significantly deeper than it has been in the past. We weren't surprised though judging by the amount of water that has fallen out of the sky over the past few months. Rob and Jim tested the water for depth and Rob took his Range Rover through first. Then we followed in our Defender and could feel the current and volume of water pushing us towards the bridge; as we came out of the ford we very nearly gave a dog an unintentional bath, as he tried to play with our "bow-wave'. Tom came through next in his Disco 2 and it was the first time he had driven this ford. He was really pleased to have done it, if a little fast! Les and Jane brought up the rear as cool as ever.

The day came to a close at the end of Moreton Drive. We had been truly blessed with the weather, great company and a good day planned by our Green Lanes Officer, Rob Elliott; with a bit of assistance from the Club's Rights of Way Officer, Jim Welch. A fantastically well-organized day of 'Responsible, Rural, Recreation', which was calm, relaxed and thoroughly enjoyed by all. Jim and I are already looking forward to the next Green Lane trip at the end of April. A Great Day Rob – Well Done!

MANNINGTON RTV

After a lengthy spell of dry weather there was optimism that the RTV trial event at the Mannington site would be relatively mud-free, but two days and nights of rain immediately prior to the event put paid to that theory! The site is one of the club's favourites, with mixed terrain ranging from woodland to sand-quarry, steep banks to deep holes – and the conditions certainly tested the drivers.

Fifteen drivers signed-on for the event, which was – as usual – split into three classes: Long wheel base, Short wheel base and Leafsprung. Some of the courses and gates were very tight, perhaps favouring the short wheelbase vehicles, with some of the dips and peaks catching out the long wheel base drivers in terms of entry and departure angles.

Nonetheless, Trevor Harmer, driving a Range Rover, managed a very creditable 10 penalty points (completing no fewer than seven of the ten sections as 'clears'), thereby winning the LWB competition. In the SWB class, there was a win for Martin Dover who managed eight clear sections, and only amassed 2 penalty points. The reduced articulation of the leafers caused one or two problems in cross-axle sections, but nevertheless Robert Shadbolt managed three clear sections on his way to winning the leafsprung competition with 31 penalty points.

The watery and muddy conditions in some areas of the site caught out one or two of the drivers, but winching and towing was – as usual – carried out safely and efficiently.

Martin Dover was very pleased with his win, saying afterwards: "All sections were drivable (as they should be) with just a couple of clears being rather challenging!"

On returning to Pulham, each vehicle then drove the gymkhana course for a second time, but this time in reverse! Points were awarded for accuracy of navigation (assessed from elapsed time against an optimum and total distance covered) and for the closeness of the two gymkhana runs in terms of time and of course the answers to the treasure hunt questions.

When all the scores were added up, and penalty points subtracted, Robin and Jackie Dumbreck emerged as the winners of Andy's run, whilst the winners of Willem's run, and overall champions, were Rob Elliott and Lisa Gilby.

All the participants and passengers then got stuck in to a delicious barbecue (very generously provided by Willem), and there was delight when it was announced that entry fees, donations (and Willem's donation-matching promise) meant that The Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance would benefit from a total of £372 raised from a very enjoyable day.

Dear Sheila

A Land Rover stalling after being driven a short distance can be caused by a variety of faults with the engine. Start by checking that there is no debris in the fuel line. If it is clear, check the jubilee clips holding the vacuum pipes onto the inlet manifold. If none of these approaches solves the problem, it could be that the fuel pump itself is faulty, causing low delivery pressure to the carburetor float chamber.

I hope this helps.



BOOK REVIEW LAND ROVER – Series I, II, IIA and III By James Taylor

This could hardly be described as a bed-time read (the book is a bit big for holding comfortably when lying down!), but it's a really good addition to one's Land Rover library if you're interested — as I am - in Land Rover ephemera, especially the advertising campaigns that have characterised the years covered by the book.

The book acknowledges that there has rarely been a British success story like the Land-Rover. The series of vehicles depicted and described take the reader from the beginning in 1948 through to 1985. In the


book James Taylor (who is well known as a writer about Land Rovers of all sorts), provides a detailed study of the Land-Rover's evolution through the period and the variants and special-purpose versions that were produced. There have been other books that tell the story of the development of our favourite vehicle, but uniquely, it is the manufacturer's own sales brochures and advertising that supply the illustrations, which number some 400 and serve not only to correctly depict the vehicles but also to re-create the atmosphere of the times when they were made.

One of things that I really liked about the book was the vast number of advertisements that I simply hadn't seen before. The vast majority of the early ones – through to the early 1970s – were hand-painted (though it's easy to see that many were based on the same company photographs) and for anyone interested in graphic design and advertising – leaving to one side the inherent interest in all things Land Rover – the book doubles up as a history of advertising and marketing.

The earlier advertisements are very much to do with the utilitarian nature of the vehicle, featuring farmers and other users to whom the plethora of PTOs would appeal; it's not until the advent of the Series III that distinctly life-style advertisements make an entrance, showing – for example a Land Rover being used to tow a large yacht on a trailer in a leisure environment. Another interesting section is that devoted to the sales literature that was used to market the special vehicles – fire engines and ambulances, for example.

So it's very much a book that can be enjoyed at all levels, even just looking at the pictures (although there is some very interesting and informative text to accompany them). Priced at £35 (although available through Amazon at £21.70) it's quite expensive (although as I got mine for Christmas, that wasn't such an issue!), but if you're interested in advertising and the history of Land Rovers combined, it's a lovely book.

JIM WELCH, DLRC RIGHTS-OF-WAY OFFICER

63 year old (*I thought he was much younger!*) Jim Welch joined the club in 2008. He was looking for somewhere to enjoy a social, friendly group of people who also share a passion for vehicles with a Green Oval. He currently owns an Alveston Red 2000 Land Rover Defender TD5 110 County Station Wagon, although a Range Rover Classic also features in his ownership history. He cites as his best experience in a Land Rover was when he was attached to Ops Group HQ, London Fire Brigade, as a Driver/ Operator of a Police Spec Range Rover Vogue, carrying specialist equipment to incidents around Central London, during which one outstanding memory was driving at



70mph down Park Lane with blue lights flashing and sirens wailing. His worst experience was paying the bill at A L Services following a cylinder head re-build to my TD5!

If money was no object then he'd like to own a Range Rover Sport, perhaps making his dream journey to Libya to see where his Dad was stationed in the Western Desert during the Second World War.

Jim doesn't participate in trials, preferring to keep his 110 in good condition (and one piece!) for green laning trips, his most memorable being doing the Rock Climb in Happy Valley, North Wales – this part of the route has now been closed.

Before moving to Dorset, Jim was a London Fire-Fighter for 20 years, serving in Central London, the last 12 years of which he was based at London Fire Brigade Headquarters, Lambeth, River Section. His career spanned and included 5 years of Emergency Crash Rescue, dealing with anything and everything in Central London. He was also a Senior Coxwain on The River Thames Fireboat and was awarded Three Commendations for Brave Conduct whilst serving in London Fire Brigade and also the Fire Brigade 20 Year Service and Good Conduct Medal at a special ceremony in Central London.

As a part-time Fire-Fighter and Special Effects Technician between 1976 – 1994, Jim was based at Shepperton Studios and worked on many films including *Full Metal Jacket*, *Patriot Games*, and Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*; he received a Personal Commendation from Robert De-Niro for Fire-Fighting skill during the making of Frankenstein.

Jim is currently a Fire Equipment Service and Maintenance Engineer, but manages to fit in the recently revived role of Club Rights of Way Officer. In this capacity he attends frequent meetings at County Hall, and as the Dorset GLASS rep, is very much involved with keeping up-to-date with the threat posed by the Deregulation Bill. He's passionate about keeping our rights-of-way open, and anyone thinking of going green-laning ought to check with Jim first about their proposed route, so they can keep things legal!

MEMBER PROFILE

ANDY WILSON - PR officer & Editor of The Dorset Rover

Andy joined the club in 2010, having just purchased his first 'proper' Land Rover, a Defender 90 TDCi. It's still more a less a 'shiny', though various green-lane trips have left their mark! Andy always wanted a Land Rover; in fact the first car he drove (at the age of 13 or 14) was an Army Series 2 which he trundled around a parade ground where his father was based, although the first motorised vehicle he ever drove was an old, grey Ferguson tractor (that was aged 9 on his uncle's farm in Yorkshire). Andy was one of those strange children who never wanted a



sports car; he said: "Ever since I can remember I'd always wanted a proper Land Rover, and the Defender was purchased after a couple of Freelanders."

He cites as his best experience in a Land Rover driving Strata Florida for the first time, and the worst experience was definitely a near-roll whilst trialling at Knitson. He's very happy with the Defender, but if money were no object, then he'd buy a good 130 ambulance, and pay Nene Overland to do a full professional conversion into a luxury camper. Having done that, Andy would like to spend a couple of weeks driving the mountain trails around Ronda (in Andalucia in Spain) as preparation for a trip through the Atlas Mountains.

The best part of being a member of DLRC for Andy is the friendship and camaraderie that comes as a result of owning such an iconic vehicle. The second best part of it has been the opportunity to become editor of The Dorset Rover, which he's now been doing for a couple of years.

Since the 'incident' at Knitson, Andy hasn't driven in a trial – he finds it's safer to be behind a camera rather than a steering wheel, but he enjoys pottering around on green-lanes, whether locally or further afield when time allows. As mentioned earlier, his favourite route would have to be Strata Florida (with Sarn Helen a close second), although, as he points out, trundling up or down the Jubilee Trail in Moreton is an instant 'fix'! As he says: "If you own a Land Rover, you don't have to drive across the Sahara; sometimes it's enough to know that you could."

Andy genuinely enjoys putting the club magazine together, although he wishes that sometimes he had more material from the wider membership. He recently completed a research project into the history of the club (which was 25 years old in 2012), and the resultant publication of *A Short History of the DLRC* seems to have been well received. He's also an avid collector of interesting Land Rover models and other ephemera.

Important information for competitors

If you wish to take part in events please take note of the following points:

- 1. Vehicles must have front and rear recovery points
- 2. Seatbelts
- 3. The battery must be secured
- 4. Any load must be securely tied down
- 5. The hand brake must work
- 6. No passengers under 14 years (except for Tyros)
- 7. MOT or photocopy of your MOT must be shown (if an MOT is required for your vehicle)
- 8. An additional return spring is required on mechanical throttles
- 9. Steering linkages will be checked
- 10. Rear springs on coil-sprung trucks to be jubilee clipped (or similar) to prevent springs dislocating
- 11. Wheel spacers are not to be used
- 12. A 24mm, 3 strand, 8 ton tow-rope in nylon or polypropylene and suitable shackle to be carried for recovery user
- 13. Fire extinguishers are advised but not essential

Will vehicles please be at the site by 9.15am for scrutineering Anyone arriving after 10.00am will NOT be allowed to compete

You are reminded that you should check by phone before arriving at an event. If you arrive and there are no club officials then the event has been cancelled and no attempt should be made to drive round the site.

most, so long as they are kept under control. Please be aware that at most events people will be taking photographs which could be used in web or paper-based publications.





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


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
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
